On the corner of MacArthur and Park Boulevards, the ochool is very easy to reach. It is a mile or so east of Lake Merritt, just out of downtown Dakland.

Drivers can simply follow MacArthur Blvd (Highway 50). The School is about four miles east of the SF-Ockland Bridge.

bance Petterns! An answer to the query, "Just how is this dance done?"

A very active Research Committee, under the chairmanship of Lucile Czarnowski, of the U. of Cal. Dept. of Physical Education, and adviser of the UC student dance group, is now engaged in the project of preparing written descriptions of the many dances commonly done by folk dance groups in this area.

Other Committee members now working on this bli job are Clarice Dechent of Chang's and the 5 F State College, Henry "Buzz" Glass, past president of the Federation, of Lodi and waypoints, and Ted Lyman of the Berkeley Folk Dancers and the Scandinavian group. The Federation officers are ex-officio members of the Committee.

Definitely planned is the issuance of a set of introductory material, such as brief explanations of standard steps, useful abbreviations to cut down time and effort in describing dances, and similar notes of value to leaders and learners alike.

As for the dances themselves, the Committee is preparing suggested "patterns" based upon whatever material is already available, and upon the members' own wide personal experience in dancing and leading in this area. These outlines will be made available to all who wish to examine them, and comments for possible improvements are urgently invited by the Research Committee.

Patterns will thus be evolved which can be generally agreed upon as being the manner in which the dances will be done at Federation affairs. It is hoped that that will eliminate some difficulties in doing those dances for which the complete patterns are not now uniform throughout the various clubs. Some of these now cause "traffic jams" at Festivals, inter-club parties, and exhibitions.

In order to ensure that all may have an opportunity to contribute ideas, the Committee is now furnishing to each club sample forms showing the plan proposed for presenting the dances. Mational origin, history, music, references—as well as a detailed description of the steps of the dance itself—are covered. Comments on these forms should be put into the hands of some member of the Committee by January 15, in order that they may be used at a Committee meeting planned for January 16.

It is expected that some dences will be ready in written form for perusul and suggestions at the January Festival. Final copies of a few dances will probably be ready at the February Festival for general distribution.

Dances will be released in loose-leaf form as fast as they can be put into final shape. A small charge will probably be made to cover necessary costs.

Judging from the wide interest which has been expressed in this type of project, it is expected that most folk dencers will want to start personal collections of the dance sheets. Such collections will be of both immediate and permanent value.
